



The Self and the World - Reading and Writing Short Fiction (E1ELL002C)

Introduction	<p>This programme offers an introduction to close reading strategies for understanding literacy texts, with an emphasis on setting and character development in narratives. Featuring short stories of different genres by authors from diverse cultural backgrounds, the programme adopts a two-pronged approach:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. at the critical thinking level, it guides students to examine the relationship between the self and the world in literature, while learning about narrative strategies and devices;2. at the experiential learning level, it encourages students to develop their capacity for reflecting on themselves, others, and everyday life through creative writing. <p>To this end, the programme also features a substantial writing component. Students will take inspiration from the themes and literary techniques discussed throughout the programme and draw on their own ideas and experiences in writing. Experimenting with literacy form will remain a focal point, as students attempt writing in both realist and non-realist genres</p>
